Bird Tech Talk

Question- A Classic T-Bird owner is thinking of selling the car and wants to know what it is worth,

Answer- A short answer would be, “What anyone is willing to pay is what it is worth.” However, price guidelines have been taken from various auctions and private sales. *Old Cars* publishes the values yearly in its price guide. The market has been depressed for these cars lately, and these are only guidelines. One could also search “E-Bay” or “Bring A Trailer” auction sites for more prices. The table below lists prices for various categories of

condition by year. Power accessories, air conditioning, radial tires, and wire wheels would also add value. Category 1 - Excellent; restored show car; not driven; work of art. Category 2 - Fine; well restored or excellent original; driven less than 1000 miles yearly. Category 3 - Very Good; restored or original driver in good shape; “20” footer*. Category 4 - Good; Driver and needs work. Category 5 - Restorable; needs complete restoration; needs everything; may not be running Category. 6 - Parts Car; weathered, wrecked and /or stripped for its parts.

*“20” Footer – At twenty feet the car looks good. Any closer and flaws can be seen.

The following is from the San Francisco Bay Area Thunderbird Newsletter in what is known as Paul's Corner. There are two items in this story that would be good to pass on. The first one is about how to release a hood when the hood cable breaks and the second is what to do when smelling electrical wires burning.

"I received a call from one of my old customers, and he wanted me to pick up his 1955 Tbird and do a few repairs. I picked it up in Tiburon and brought it to his property in San Francisco. He wanted to fix his gas gauge, windshield wipers, shift boot, gas cap, and a few other little items. I was backing it out of his garage in San Francisco when the horn started to blow by itself. I tried to open the hood to disconnect the horn wire that went through the steering column to stop the horn from blowing. The hood cable broke in my hand. I also started to smell an electrical burning smell. I turned off the key right away and the smell stopped. I restarted the engine to get the car off the street. I put the car on a rack to raise the car in the air so I could open the hood from underneath. I had heard about this procedure to open the hood from underneath the car. I now had an opportunity to try it out. Luckily, he had a long flat bar about 3 feet long and one and half inches wide. I could see the release lever from the bottom of the car with a handy dandy flashlight. The lever was in line with the exhaust manifold. The manifold was in the perfect position to use as a fulcrum point to pry on the release lever for the hood in order to open the hood. The hood popped open very easily. I wanted to disconnect the battery because of the burning electrical smell that I had noticed out in the street. It is ironic that this had happened because I had just bought and installed on my car an emergency hood release cable at the Sacramento meet. It was late in the day, and I just wanted to leave after I thought about what could have happened, like a big fire under the dashboard. This is a day in the life of a mechanic. This also is an example of why you must always be alert while working around an automobile."

There is no bragging or complaining, just real-life owner experiences on real life classic cars. Reading about other enthusiasts' experiences reminds me of how spending time on our classics is very unlike working on current cars. With the classics, we are almost like historians, bringing back a lost treasure and using it for what it was made to for: driving and enjoyment. So, while there may be the occasional suggestion at home about parting with my old car, I have the good fortune to have two grown sons who are also interested in the old car hobby; with their help, hopefully, I'll be able to do this for many more years to come! Now, where did I put that adjustable wrench? I just need to tighten this fitting.

CTCI Board Meeting Highlights January 12, 2024

President Chuck Thompson outlined his goals for 2024. They are to increase CTCI membership (both for CTCI and our chapters); improve chapter relations and communications; offer more CTCI activities both at a national scale and local (in partnership with the local chapter); and finally, set up committees to support the above priorities.

Treasurer's Report: John Kledis gave the Treasurer's report. He explained that he is currently working on the year end financials for CTCI. He is also working on the 990, which is the form that is used for our tax reporting to the IRS. So at this time he had nothing new to report. He continued to believe that we would show a functional loss of \$20,000 to \$25,000 for the year. He did note that "all items being equal" that the new approved dues increase would have changed the current loss into a positive gain for the year.



2024 Convention Update: Marsha Hash presented the status of the 2024 International Convention. The International Convention will be held in Des Moines, IA, from August 20-25, 2024. She noted that Garrett Shropshire had completed his negotiations with the hotel and the contract has been approved. She outlined the benefits of the hotel stay which includes free breakfast, free wi-fi, and includes a large parking area for the display – judging of our Thunderbirds as well as a wash station. The convention committee is planning for the Welcome Party and Awards Banquet to be held at the hotel, as well as several interesting tours to local attractions. Finally, she explained that the committee hoped to have the Convention registration site and form completed by the end of January. Meanwhile, we do wish to remind all members that hotel registration is open. Please see the CTCL website or The Early Bird to get the link for hotel reservations. Please register early to hold your place for the 2024 Convention hotel.

Member Renewals: Garrett presented membership renewals through the end of 2023. We ended the year with 4,015 members which is higher than we estimated. In 2023 we added 218 new members. Garrett was pleased that the club exceed 4,000 members before the end of the year, but noted we still need to continue to work on gaining new members. He noted the possibility to increase members in 2024 as the result of the vote to now include '02 – '05 Retro – Modern Classics in CTCL.

Garrett outlined that we are currently in the member renewal process. Because we moved up the process by one full Early Bird cycle (about two months) that we are now way ahead of last year's renewals. Currently we have approximately 1550 members who have not yet renewed their membership.

Office Activity: Garrett presented the Office Activity Report. He noted that beyond the membership items the staff had been mostly involved in four areas. First, to help create/improve CTCL's new member recruitment programs and brochures; second to modify all CTCL's documents relating/referencing Retro – Modern Classics; third to complete all of the financial bookkeeping items related to the 2023 Convention; and fourth by assisting the 2024 International Convention Committee in planning for the next convention.

The board approved the Investment Committee's recommendation to move towards more fixed investments. The investment committee will be working to develop a new plan for 2024 and present it to the board.

In a separate action, the Board approved the appointment of Brian Carron to the Investment Committee.

2023 Convention Recap: Brian Carron presented, and the Board approved the final 2023 Convention Financial Report. That report showed a net profit of \$3,157.01. In addition, the Board approved returning all of the chapter donations back to the individual chapters. That amount was NOT included in the net profit amount previously presented. The Board noted and thanked all of the chapters for their generous donation. Those monies are being returned with grateful thanks and hopes that chapters will continue to invest, involve and support future CTCL conventions. Finally, the Board approved presenting part of the Convention profit back to the host chapter - Central Florida T-Birds. The Board recognized and appreciated the effort of the Central Florida T-Birds for putting on the Convention and is very glad to share in the profit.

2024 Board Meeting Schedule: Chuck Thompson presented the 2024 Board meeting schedule. The meeting dates are as follows:

Chuck Thompson discussed the 100th Anniversary of Route 66 which will occur in 2026. He explained that a national committee had been created. While it is too early to know what national or local events would be planned, he did want for all members to be aware of the upcoming anniversary and for CTCL to begin thinking on how best to become involved.

The Board appointed Bob Bly and Brian Carron to work with the other three Thunderbird organizations (VTCL, ITC, and Thunderbird Nest) to see where we might work on "co-branded" events.



As with every Board meeting, the Board reviewed all member comments about CTCI operations submitted over the past two months.

The next Board meeting is set for March 15, 2024
