Bird Tech Talk

The Items pictured in January's Tech Talk were 1955-56 Mercury Station Wagon taillights. These were a common custom effect for 1955-56 Ford cars and T-Birds in the late 50's and 60's. They are now rare and, if found, usually have corroded and pitted metal housings and broken lenses. I bought these from an owner who had re-chromed the housings, and the plastic lenses were in excellent original shape. New lenses and rubber gaskets are also being reproduced. I replaced the light sockets and pigtail wires with new ones. The metal housings bolt onto the T-Bird body in place of the original tail and backup lights and require no bodywork. Some T-Bird owners love these while others do not; see what you think.











Door Lock Installation By Jim Delton – CTCl Tech. Group

When I installed the new lock cylinders, I had the door panel off and could see both sides. As I put the lock cylinder through the hole, it had the little piece on the back with the spring around it. I think the post went into something with a hole that acted as an anchor, and the "lever" part of the piece went into a "fork" or something that got moved up and down to move the lock/unlock blocker. When you have it, all positioned, you slide the retainer clip that goes through the side of the door under the weatherstripping in place, and it retains the lock cylinder, and all the parts stay in place. You can see in the photo the old part attached to the old lock cylinder and the new shiny part in the top left of the picture. You can also see they don't have quite the same dimensions; the new one has a longer but thinner post. As a result, if memory serves, the new one flopped around in the hole so much that the lever would fall out of the fork, so I used the old part.

Your parents were suddenly free from the confines of the depression and the war, and they threw themselves into working hard to make a living for their families.

You weren't neglected, but you weren't today's all-consuming family focus.

They were glad you played by yourselves. They were busy discovering the postwar world.

You entered a world of overflowing plenty and opportunity; a world where you were welcomed, enjoyed yourselves.
