BIRD TECH TALK

Vacuum Leaks- "Smoke'em If You Got'em"

Vacuum leaks can introduce more air into the engine and alter the air-fuel ratio, resulting in symptoms of rough idle, hesitation, poor acceleration, high or erratic idle, and stalling. Sometimes the vacuum leak can be heard as a whistle or sucking noise. Some traditional ways of locating a vacuum leak on the engine

are spraying starter fluid, brake cleaner, or propane over potential leak areas and listening for improvement in engine rpm or idle. These methods are messy and not suitable for evaluating vacuum lines for leaks.

My Ford Expedition developed a rough idle years ago, and the mechanic found a vacuum leak in a vacuum line with a smoke machine. Using a smoke machine is easy and harmless to the engine. A variety of smoke machines are on the market at various costs. Autoline makes the one pictured below and costs \$70 on Amazon. A typical machine uses a form of oil (baby oil in one brand), which is heated in a pot usually by a connection to the car battery. The smoke is introduced into the engine or line by very low air pressure from an air compressor source or by an air pump in the machine. Once the smoke is introduced into the engine or vacuum line, a leak is indicated by smoke leaving the leak site.

This technique would be very useful in the Classic T-Bird. One would first cover the carburetor and exhaust pipe openings with rubber gloves. To find an intake gasket leak or a carburetor base gasket leak, the smoke line would be connected to the vacuum port of the carburetor. To find a vacuum advance canister membrane leak, connect the smoke tube to the line leading to the canister. Vacuum hoses to the wiper and the heater valve in the heater box could be checked by connecting the smoke tube to a vacuum line feeding these areas; do the same for the intake manifold water valve vacuum line or brake booster line. Exhaust leaks can also be easily found.

So, the next time a vacuum or exhaust leak occurs and can't be found, get a smoke machine and "smoke 'em".



Member News

Ten members attended the Fellowship Luncheon in Murdock, NE, on April 19, 2025. Six classic Birds were driven to the event. Rob and Vicki Kinsey, Marty and Mary Lou Bierman, John and Barb La Duke, Crystal and Jerry Swensen, Tom Woodman, and Jack Sanford attended. The weather was perfect, the food was great, the fellowship was evident, and the roads were smooth.











ou know our man, Al Rogers, for his cover photography and his centerspread stories in each issue of *Old Cars*, but most people don't know that, automotively speaking, there's even more to Al beyond his camera and pen.

Starting in the 1970s, Al served in many roles as a manager at Ford Motor Co. He oversaw several aspects of the manufacturing of many different Ford Motor Co. vehicles, including the last Thunderbird, which began production for the 2002 model year. In our conversations, production of this 10th-generation T-Bird comes up often, and he finally offered to share in *Old Cars* some insight into his part in building the '02 Thunderbirds for this Mustang and T-Bird issue.

"I was a manufacturing manager," he said. "I was in various departments over that two-year period of preparing for the manufacturing and then production of the last Thunderbird: body, paint, pre-delivery and quality control. I helped create processes within the departments to produce the T-Bird, and the feasibility to make it operational, because we had to adapt it into a pre-existing system within the paint and body departments at Wixom Assembly Plant." It was the first time the Thunderbird had been built at Wixom since the 1970s, even though the first T-Birds had been built there.

At that time, Wixom was also building the Lincoln Town Car, Continental and LS. Al said the manufacturing process started in the body shop with the floor pan of each car, upon which the bodies were welded together on a buck by hand and robotics. From there, the Thunderbird and Lincoln bodies traveled down a half-mile tunnel on a conveyor to the paint shop where they'd be prepped for paint, painted, polished, and then go to the trim department.

"The LS and T-Bird were built together, because the T-Bird was basically on the LS platform, so LS and T-Bird would go to their trim department on the second level and the Town Car and Continental would go onto an elevator and get lowered to the main floor and enter their trim department."

The 2002-2005 Thunderbird and LS were built on the Jaguar platform, and ultimately, that connection killed them, Al says.

"The Thunderbird was a ray of hope for Ford Motor Co. and for Wixom, at the time. Between the Thunderbird and the LS, that was the future. The LS was produced with the thought of being able to sell it in over 20 different countries. It was definitely built for global sales. We built right- and left-hand LSes for sale in China, Taiwan, Japan. Then along came Premier Automotive Group and that was its demise. The cars that the LS was designed to compete against was now part of Ford Motor Co. The Premier Automotive Group would have been Jaguar, Volvo, Aston Martin and Land Rover — they were already established automobiles within the market."

Interestingly, Al said Bob Tasca, Sr., the famous dealer who raced Fords, was a highly respected consultant to Ford at this time, and went through Ford assembly plants to rate their performance and products. He said Tasca had two suggestions for the 2002 T-Bird: bigger wheels tires, and more performance. The additional rubber never came to be, but for 2003, the Thunderbird's horsepower rose to 280 hp from 252 in 2002 — was that Tasca's influence?

Al also noted that the 2002 T-Bird's retro emblems were treated special.

"They were highly coveted and protected because they were very desirable—
that gave that car its identity," Al said. "Ford was very protective of these emblems.
They were in a secured area; it was highly unusual. The only other time I recall something like that was when we had the Diamond Jubilee Continentals. Those cars' parts were in a secured area, as well."

Out of his pride for the work they did at Wixom, and for the Thunderbird, All bought a new 2003 Thunderbird. He also helped many build other Ford vehicles, which he also bought. Hopefully he'll share those memories in a future issue.


